Check out what our Middle School's did this month!




Our Cottonwood Science lesson was a hit this past month! We sent students looking for stars at G.S. Lakie and Gilbert Paterson!

Olivia Poole Of Ojibwe White Earth Reservation, Minnesota

The Ojibwe woman who invented the Jolly Jumper





From the collections at Makah Cultural and Research Center

On White Earth Reservation, Olivia Poole saw mothers using **cradleboards** as baby carriers.

Cradleboards allowed mothers and caregivers greater freedom to work or perform their daily routine while their baby was safely secured on the board.

Some mothers suspended cradleboards from a sturdy tree branch or structure to act as a hammock or swing, providing the baby with amusement.

Poole witnessed mothers pulling on the ropes or leather straps suspending the cradleboard to bounce the baby up and down.

This allowed mothers to work uninterrupted while the babies entertained themselves with the bouncing motion.

Karva Chauth (Hindu)

Nov 1- A one day fast kept by married Hindu women for the wellbeing and longevity of theirhusbands. The husbands feed the first bite to their wives only after they see the moon.



Bunka No Hi (Japan)

Nov 3- A national holiday dedicated to the love of freedom and promotion of Japanese culture.



Veterans Day (USA)



Nov 11- It was first proclamed as armistice Day in 1919, to commemorate the termination (at 11 AM on November 11, 1918) of worl War I.

Dia de los Muertos (Mexico)



Nov 2- This day is also known as the Day of the Dead. It is celebrated in parts of the United States and Central America. Families build altars in their homes surrounded with flowers, food and burning candles.



Diwali (Sikh and Hindu)



Nov 12- Diwali is also known as the 'Festival of Lights'. It symbolises the spiritual "victory of light over darkness, good over evil, and knowledge over ignorance". It lasts for five days.

SHICHI-GO-SAN





Nov 15- Prayers are offered for children's growth. The ages of three and five for boys, three and seven for girls are celebrated. On this day, children dress up in their gala dresses and go with their parents to a Shinto shrine to pay a visit to the tutelary deity. Children are given thousand-year candy which is red and white (auspicious colours) with crane and turtle illustrations (symbols of long life).

Guru Nanak's Birthday (Sikh)



Nov 27- Guru Nanak was born in 1469 CE. He was hte first of the Ten Gurus of the Sikh faith and founded Sikhism. An accomplished poet, 974 of his hymns are in the Sikh sculptures, the Shri Guru Granth Sahib.

Lokash Jayanti (Jain)

Nov 27- This day commemorates the birth of a famous 15th century reformer, Lonka Saha, who opposed temple worship and use of images.
